REPORT ON MACHAKOS COUNTY INTEGRATED DEVELOPMENT PLAN 2018-2022

Hon. Speaker: Hon. Members, on this Order, we have one business by the chairperson of Trade, Economic Planning and Industrialization Committee, Hon. Kieti.

Hon. Kieti: Thank you, Madam Speaker. I am here to present a motion. Madam Speaker, that aware that Section 104(1) of the County Governments Act No. 17 of 2012 provides that a County Government shall plan for the county and no public funds shall be appropriated outside a planning framework developed by the County Executive Committee and approved by the County Assembly;

Aware that, Section 108 of the same Act provides that there shall be a five-year county integrated development plan for each county which shall have-

- a) Clear goals and objectives;
- b) An implementation plan with clear outcomes;
- c) Provisions for monitoring and evaluation; and
- d) Clear reporting mechanisms.

Noting that the second Machakos County Integrated Development Plan 2018-2022 was submitted to the Assembly on 10th August, 2018 and then committed to the Committee on Trade, Planning and Industrialization for consideration and eventual tabling and adoption by the House; Madam Speaker, I wish to move the motion that this House discusses and approves the report of the Committee on Trade, Economic Planning and Industrialization on the Second Machakos County Integrated Development Plan, 2018-2022.

Thank you, Madam Speaker. I call upon Hon. Abdirahman to second the motion.

Hon. Kieti: Madam Speaker, once again I am here to present the report on Committee on Trade, Planning and Industrialization, Report on the Machakos County Integrated Development Plan 2018-2022.

INTRODUCTION

Preface

Madam Speaker, the County Integrated Development Plan is a plan that gives general guide to development in the county for a period of five years. Integrated development planning is a process through which efforts at national and devolved levels of Government and other relevant public institutions are coordinated at local level and through which economic, social, environmental, legal and spatial aspects of development are brought together to produce a plan that meets the needs and development targets set for the benefit of the community.

Madam Speaker, the second Machakos County Integrated Development Plan 2018-2022 was submitted to the Assembly on 10th August, 2018 and then committed to the Committee on Trade, Planning and Industrialization for consideration and eventual tabling and adoption by the House.

Legal Framework

Madam Speaker, Section 104(1) of the County Governments Act No. 17 of 2012 provides that a County Government shall plan for the county and no public funds shall be appropriated outside a planning framework developed by the County Executive Committee and approved by the County Assembly. Additionally, Section 106(2) of the same Act stipulates that County plans shall be based on the functions of County governments as specified in the Fourth Schedule of the Constitution and other relevant national policies. Section 107(1) provides that to guide, harmonize and facilitate development within each county there shall be the following County plans:

- a) County Integrated Development Plan;
- b) County Sectoral plans;
- c) County Spatial Plan; and
- d) Cities and Urban Areas Plans as provided for under the Urban Areas and Cities Act No. 13 of 2011.

Madam Speaker, Section 107(2) of the County Governments Act, 2012 stipulates that the County plans shall be the basis for all budgeting and spending in a County. Further, section 108 provides that:

1. There shall be a five year county integrated development plan for each County which shall have-
 - a) Clear goals and objectives;
 - b) An implementation plan with clear outcomes;
 - c) Provisions for monitoring and evaluation; and
 - d) Clear reporting mechanisms.
2. Each county integrated development plan shall at least identify –
 - a) The institutional framework, which shall include an organization chart, required for-
 - i. The implementation of the integrated development plan; and
 - ii. Addressing the county's internal transformation needs;
 - b) As informed by the strategies and programmes set out in the plan-
 - i. Any investment initiatives in the county;
 - ii. Any development initiatives in the county, including infrastructure, physical, social, economic and institutional development;
 - iii. All known projects, plans and programs to be implemented within the county by any organ of state; and
 - iv. The key performance indicators set by the county.
- 3) An integrated development plan shall-
 - a. have attached to it maps, statistics and other appropriate documents; or
 - b. refer to maps, statistics and other appropriate documents that are not attached but held in a GIS based database system.

Provided that the plans under paragraphs (a) and (b) are open for public inspection at the offices of the county in question.

- 4) A resource mobilization and management framework shall be reflected in a county's integrated development plan and shall at least-
 - a) include the budget projection required under the law governing county government financial management;
 - b) indicate the financial resources that are available for capital project developments and operational expenditure; and

- c) include a financial strategy that defines sound financial management and expenditure control: as well as ways and means of increasing revenues and external funding for the county and its development priorities and objectives, which strategy may address the following-
- i. Revenue raising strategies;
 - ii. Asset management strategies;
 - iii. Financial management strategies;
 - iv. Capital financing strategies;
 - v. Operational financing strategies; and
 - vi. Strategies that would enhance cost-effectiveness.

Importance of Planning

Madam Speaker, planning is important as it helps in the allocation of resources. Appreciating that needs will always be more than the available resources, planning will ensure:

- i. Effective use of scarce resources;
- ii. Efficiency in service delivery;
- iii. Cooperation and synergy in county entities;
- iv. Prioritization of projects to be undertaken within the planning period;
- v. Attraction of additional funding; and
- vi. Strengthening of democracy and governance.

Madam Speaker, the County Annual Development Plans in each fiscal year are extracted from the County Integrated Development Plan.

Mandate of the Committee on Trade, Planning and Industrialization

Hon. Speaker, the Committee on Trade, Planning and Industrialization was established pursuant to the second schedule of the Machakos County Assembly Standing Orders. The mandate of the committee includes: dealing with all matters related to economic planning, tourism, trade development, regulation including markets; and outdoor advertising; trade licenses (excluding regulation of professions); fair trading practices and statistics; and all matters relating to the delineation and management of decentralized units, urban areas and municipalities.

REVIEW OF THE FIRST MACHAKOS COUNTY INTEGRATED DEVELOPMENT PLAN (2013-2017)

Madam Speaker, the Machakos County Integrated Development Plan 2018-2022, has provided a review of the previous CIDP 2013-2017, showing sectoral performance over the period. It has highlighted the major challenges during implementation of the plan, lessons learnt and recommendations. It further provides an analysis of County revenue and both recurrent and development expenditures over the period. The performance of the County local revenue was below average recording 46.4 per cent of the set target. The review highlights social-economic and political issues including waivers and devolution transitions among others as contributing factors to the performance.

Madam Speaker, allocation from the National Government was 91 per cent. Absorption of the budget for both recurrent and development expenditure was far much above average which in turn led to transformation of various sectors. Despite the high absorption, the County experienced challenges such as delays in disbursement of National Government allocation and low performing revenue streams which hindered achievement of 100 per cent absorption rate.

The review highlights some of the projects undertaken successfully over the period to include: water project; reducing distance to water points by drilling boreholes ; food security through distribution of free seeds and free ploughing to farmers; health care management including face lifting and equipping of the Machakos Level V hospital, purchase of ambulances; tarmacking and maintenance of roads, purchase of road equipment, construction of the people's park, rehabilitation of the Kenyatta stadium to international standards, and provision of bursaries to needy and bright students among many other projects.

Summary of Planned targets Versus Achievements in different Sectors

Madam Speaker, the planned targets verses achievements of the first CIDP 2013-2017, in the different sectors have been highlighted as follows;

Agriculture and Cooperate Development Sector

In the 2013-2017 periods, the main target under the sector was enhancement of food security. The CIDP highlights the following achievements:

- a) Ploughing of 11,586 acres of land.
- b) Distribution of 621,934 Kg and 26,143 bags of free certified seeds and fertilizer.
- c) Distribution of 59,291 indigenous breeding chicks to farmers and;
- d) Installation of 250 greenhouses across the county.

Energy, Infrastructure and ICT sector

Madam Speaker, the planned targets under this sector were, installation of renewable energy street lighting, purchase of road maintenance equipment and upgrading of road network, establishment of local area network and development of county departments' website.

The CIDP highlights the following achievements in this sector:

- a) Graded and graveled 950km of roads, tarmacked 56km of roads, installed 365m of culverts and constructed 1060m of drifts.
- b) CCTV cameras installation in major towns and internet connectivity across county offices.

- c) Lighting of 368 markets.
- d) Grading of Matuu Bus Park.
- e) Purchase of road maintenance equipment and vehicles.
- f) Purchase of plant and equipment; 19 graders, 6 excavators, 3 wheel loaders, 2 heavy and 5 light vibrating rollers, 2 pneumatic rollers, 2 chip spreaders, 1 bitumen distributor, 31 tippers, 10 water bowsers, 11 fuel tankers, 1 low bed loader, 4 dumpers, and 3 service trucks.

Health Sector

Madam Speaker, the planned targets under this sector were: purchase of 70 ambulances, face lifting of 36 Level III, four Level IV, and one Level V health facilities, recruitment of health workers, reduction of HIV prevalence from 4.6 per cent to less than 3 per cent and construction of oxygen plant.

The CIDP highlights the following achievements in this sector:

- a) Purchase of 70 ambulances and 10 response motorbikes.
- b) Face lifting of 36 Level III, two Level IV health facilities and the Machakos Level V Hospital.
- c) Purchase of generators for two Level IV facilities and Machakos Level V Hospital.
- d) Recruitment of 800 health workers.
- e) Reduction of HIV prevalence from 4.6 per cent to 4.5 per cent.
- f) Installation of a fully functional oxygen plant at Machakos Level V Hospital.
- g) Construction of Machakos Level V Hospital perimeter wall.

Public Administration Sector

Madam Speaker, the CIDP highlights the following sub-sectors under this sector:

- a. Office of the Governor.
- b. County Public Service.
- c. Economic planning.
- d. Decentralized units and County administration.
- e. Machakos forensic and research centre.
- f. County image.
- g. Legal office.
- h. Public Service.
- i. County Assembly.

The sector is charged with providing good leadership, formulating public policies, coordinating and supervising other sectors to ensure good working and conducive political environment.

In the public service sub-sector the CIDP indicates a planned target on modernization of human resource staff records registry that was noted as ongoing. The planned targets and achievements for the Administration Sector are outlined on **page 59-61** of the draft CIDP document.

Education, Youth and Social Welfare Sector

Madam Speaker, this sector has Education, Social Welfare, Culture and Sports sub-sectors. The planned targets under Education sub-sector were:

- a. Provision of bursary to needy students

- b. Construction of ECDE classes
- c. ECDE feeding programme
- d. Recruitment of ECDE care givers
- e. Establishment of Machakos youth and children centers.
- f. Establishment of ICT training centers.
- g. Employment of youth polytechnic instructors
- h. Equipping of youth polytechnics

The Achievements under this sub-sector as highlighted in the review are:

- a. 400 secondary schools benefited from bursaries,
- b. Construction of 50 ECDE classes,
- c. 1267 ECDE centers benefited from the feeding programme,
- d. Recruitment of 1000 ECDE care givers,
- e. Establishment of 3 youth empowerment centers,
- f. Establishment of 3 ICT training centers,
- g. Recruitment of 86 youth polytechnic instructors,
- h. Furniture supplied to 16 youth polytechnics,
- i. Establishment of One (1) public library

The planned targets under social welfare sub-sector were:

- a. Child protection and support
- b. Care and provision of assistive devices for persons with disabilities.
- c. Capacity building
- d. Gender based violence Sensitization and awareness creation

The Achievements under this sub-sector were,

- a) Support to thirty registered children's homes.
- b) Support to 300 needy persons with disability.
- c) Establishment of 4 sub-counties Gender Based Violence Multi-sectoral committees.

The planned targets under culture sub-sector were:

- a) Hold Akamba cultural festivals.
- b) Hold four herbalist meetings.
- c) Visual arts exhibition.
- d) Draft a Bill on Cultural Policy.
- e) Map cultural sites

The Achievements under this sub-sector were:

- a) One Akamba Cultural festival held.
- b) 2 meetings for Herbalist held.
- c) 20 Visual Arts Exhibition done.
- d) One cultural policy drafted.
- e) Mapping of cultural sites 30 per cent done.

The planned targets under sports sub-sector were:

- a) Upgrade and rehabilitate 2 stadia.
- b) Install goals posts and nets in 40 wards.
- c) Host a combination of 100 local, national and international sports events.
- d) Provision of sporting equipment.
- e) Create a data base for sports institutions and clubs.
- f) Set up county football club.

- g) Host an annual international cycling event.

The Achievements under this sub-sector were:

- a) Rehabilitated Kenyatta Stadium.
- b) More than 72 sporting events hosted.
- c) Governor's cup (soccer) tournament held in 40 wards in 2013.
- d) 16 schools supplied with Cricket equipment.
- e) Provided sports equipment to KICOSCA/ CASA teams.

Land, Environment and Natural Resources

Madam Speaker, the sector has lands, environment and natural resources sub-sectors. The planned targets under this sector were:

- a) Develop zoning plan for urban centres.
- b) Plant 5,000,000 trees seedlings.
- c) Develop the Sand Harvesting Act.
- d) Pollution control.
- e) Rehabilitate 10 County degraded rivers.
- f) Development of transitional implementation plans for devolved forestry functions.

The achievements under this sector were;

- a) Prepared zoning plans for 17 urban centres and one zoned map for Wamunyu town.
- b) Prepared and approved the Machakos New town local physical development plan.
- c) Prepared the Machakos Integrated Strategic Urban Development plan.
- d) 1,500,000 tree seedlings were procured and distributed for planting to institutions.
- e) Developed County Sand Harvesting Act.
- f) Ensured compliance to minimize pollution.
- g) Rehabilitated Kithoni River.
- h) Developed the Transitional Implementation Plans (TIPs) awaiting signing and approval by the County Assembly.

Water and Irrigation Sector

Madam Speaker, the planned targets under this sector were:

- a) Purchase of 8 drilling rigs.
- b) Purchase of 2 test pumping units.
- c) Purchase of 4 bulldozers for dams and water pans construction.
- d) Rehabilitation of 480 boreholes.
- e) Drilling and pump testing of 1000 new boreholes.
- f) Powering and reticulation of 400 new boreholes.
- g) Construction and rehabilitation of 520 dams and water pans.
- h) Construction of 400 weirs and distribution of 1000 PVC tanks.

Achievements

- a) Purchased 8 drilling rigs.
- b) Purchased 2 test pumping units.
- c) Procured 4 bulldozers.

- d) Rehabilitated 64 boreholes and restored water provision to community waters points.
- e) 268 new boreholes drilled, pump tested and powered.
- f) Reticulated 136 new boreholes and reduced walking distance to fetch water from 6km to 0.5 km.
- g) Constructed 215 dams and rehabilitated the existing dams and water pans.
- h) 159 weirs constructed.
- i) Purchased 1000 (10,000ltrs) tanks for public primary schools.

Commercial, Tourism and Labour Affairs sectors

Madam Speaker, the planned targets as highlighted in the CIDP under this sector were:

- a) To conduct 3 investment forums.
- b) To establish 40 modern markets in every sub-county.
- c) Develop and prepare policy and planning documents.
- d) Establishment of an investment promotion portal.
- e) Hold 2 beauty pageants annually.
- f) Prepare a tourism documentary.
- g) Map tourism sites and putting up signage.
- h) Participate in 12 tourism exhibitions.
- i) Construct 3 rest stop areas.
- j) Creation of tourism website.
- k) Establish three monuments parks.
- l) Construction of recreational facilities.
- m) Construct a studio city.
- n) Construct amphitheatre.
- o) Organize tour de Machakos cycling competition.
- p) Organize Machakos Fest (short film competition).
- q) Organize spoken word festival.
- r) Establish liquor data base.

Achievements

- a) Conducted 1 investment forum.
- b) Constructed 23 modern markets.
- c) Developed Machakos Vision 2020 strategic plan.
- d) Established investment promotion portal.
- e) Held 8 beauty pageants.
- f) Prepared one tourism documentary.
- g) Mapped tourism attraction sites and hotels.
- h) 8 tourism exhibitions held.
- i) Constructed one rest stop area.
- j) Established a tourism website.
- k) Three monuments parks constructed.
- l) Constructed Machakos People's part.
- m) Setting up of an amphitheatre.
- n) Held 2 tour de Machakos cycling competitions.
- o) 161 films submitted.
- p) Organized spoken word festival.
- q) The establishment of a liquor data base is 80 per cent complete.

Constraints in implementation of the 2013 – 2017 CIDP

Madam Speaker, a number of constraints encountered during implementation period (2013-2017) as highlighted in the CIDP are as indicated below:

- a. Inadequate budget provisions due to limited resource
- b. Slow procurement processes
- c. Climate change impacts which continued to exert negative effects on the economy. These include increased periods of drought, erratic rainfall and increase in temperatures that has led to low agricultural productivity
- d. Poor partnership with other development partners which led to delayed approval of some projects from the relevant authorities such as KENHA
- e. High rates of inflation, which greatly influenced the ever-rising cost of living. This led to increased cost of programmes/projects against the planned cost causing delay in implementation.
- f. Poor involvement of all stakeholders during planning and implementation of programmes/projects led to poor adoption, lack of community ownership, delayed implementation, vandalism and stealing of programmes/projects materials.

COUNTY DEVELOPMENT PRIORITIES AND STRATEGIES IN THE SECOND GENERATION CIDP 2018-2022

Madam Speaker, The second generation CIDP summarizes the priorities development priorities identified in each sector and links them to the Kenya vision 2030 and its medium term plans with the aim of achieving the aspirations/goals of the sustainable development goals and the African Union agenda 2063 among others.

The plan seeks to build on gains made and mediate upon lessons learned in implementation of the first CIDP. The plan will guide county planning and budgeting process for the next five years (2018-2022). Implementation of the plan will be undertaken under the following sectors:

- a) Agriculture and Cooperative Development.
- b) Energy, Infrastructure and ICT.
- c) Health.
- d) Public Administration.
- e) Education, Youth and Social Welfare.
- f) Land, Environment and Natural Resources.
- g) Water and Irrigation.
- h) Commercial Tourism and Labour Affairs.

County spatial development

Madam Speaker, the National Spatial Plan (NSP) is a national spatial vision for the country that guides the long term spatial development for a period of 30 years with 10 years reviews in accordance to Medium Term Plans (MTPs). The National Spatial Plan covers the entire territory of Kenya measuring approximately 582,646km² including 21km² of the Exclusive Economic Zone (EEZ).

The Machakos County spatial plan will describe the spatial framework within which development projects will be implemented after carrying out an assessment of natural resources within the County.

The following thematic areas are as outlined in the National Spatial Plan 2015 – 2045.

- a. Identifying resource potential growth areas-the strategies under this will include, fencing and increased surveillance, land use regulation in parks, forest areas and wild life migratory routes.
- b. Enhancing county competitiveness- the strategies under this include land use zoning to improve on public safety, transport and amenity facilities.
- c. Modernizing agriculture- the strategies under this include production of drought tolerant crops and fruit trees, improvement of livestock production, fisheries and enhanced market access.
- d. Diversifying tourism- the strategies under this include marketing of Machakos County as a major tourism destination, exploitation of film industry, sports and cultural centers. (see page 73)
- e. Managing Human settlement- the strategies under this include providing appropriate housing, upgrading slums and informal settlements and development of control policies and tools in the housing sector.
- f. Conservation of natural environment- the strategies under this include development and implementation of solid waste management plan, increase in tree cover, environmental education and sensitization.
- g. Transportation network- the strategies under this include construction, expansion and maintenance of new and existing roads and construction of non-motorized transport facilities.
- h. Providing infrastructure- the strategies under this include expansion of health, education, energy, environment and ICT infrastructure.
- i. Industrialization- the strategies under this include establishing industrial zones with supporting infrastructure.

Nairobi Metro Strategy

Madam Speaker, this is part of the development agenda for Kenya which is part of the Vision 2030. The CIDP identifies four towns in Machakos County which fall within the Nairobi Metropolitan Region. They include, Machakos, Mavoko, Tala and Kangundo.

Natural Resource Assessment

Madam Speaker, the CIDP highlights the following natural resources that exist within the County:

- a) Tana River
- b) Athi River
- c) Kapiti Plains
- d) Iveti Forest
- e) Oldonyo Sabuk National Park
- f) Limestone
- g) Quarries
- h) Sand
- i) Mazerras
- j) Yatta Plateau
- k) Kyamwilu gravitational defying area
- l) Masinga Dam

COUNTY SECTORAL DEVELOPMENT PRIORITIES AND STRATEGIES

Madam Speaker, the CIDP 2018-2022 highlights the county development priorities for each sector as follows:

Agriculture and Cooperative Development

Madam Speaker, the CIDP outlines the directorates in the sector as: the Directorates of Crops, Livestock, Veterinary services, Fisheries and Cooperative Development. The sector's goal is to reduce poverty level from 42.6% to 30% in the next 10 years. This will be achieved through implementing sector programmes indicated in pages 81-91 of the draft CIDP document.

Energy, Infrastructure and ICT Sector

Madam Speaker, this sector facilitates provision and maintenance of quality infrastructure, decent and affordable housing, transport and other public works with the aim of promoting and sustaining socio-economic development.

The sub sectors under this sector include energy; transport, roads, public works and Housing; and ICT.

The sector's goal is to reduce cost of doing business and sustain world-class state of infrastructural facilities to support current and future development. This will be achieved through implementing sector programmes indicated in pages 94-97 of the draft CIDP document

Health sector

Madam Speaker, the Health sector is critical in provision of quality, efficient and affordable health care services through provision of an integrated and high quality promotive, preventive, curative, rehabilitative and emergency services. This aims at universal health care to all citizens. The goal of the sector is to reduce livelihoods and health care services for people living in Machakos County.

This will be achieved through implementing sector programmes indicated in pages 99-104 of the draft CIDP document

Public Administration Sector

Madam Speaker, the Public Administration Sector is comprised of County Executive/Office of the Governor, County Assembly, County Treasury, Decentralized Units, County Image, County Public Service, Legal Office and Economic Planning sub-sectors.

The Sector Goal is advanced management and better policies for a functioning government. This will be achieved through implementing sector programmes indicated in pages 108-113 of the draft CIDP document

Education, Youth and Social Welfare Sector

Madam Speaker, this sector is composed of sub-sectors of Education, Youth, Social Welfare, Culture and Sports. The sector provides quality services in Early Childhood Development and Education, youth training & development, social support to the marginalized & underprivileged groups and in promotion of sports and culture. It aims to ensure all boys and girls receive inclusive and equitable quality education, achieve gender equality, and empower all women and girls.

The sector goal is inclusive and equitable quality education for all, youth and sports development, social support and safeguarded cultural heritage. This will be achieved through implementing sector programmes indicated in pages 117-122 of the draft CIDP document

Land, Environment and Natural Resources Sector

Madam speaker, this sector is composed of Lands (Physical Planning and Urban Development); Environment and Natural Resources sub sectors. The sector ensures efficient and effective administration and sustainable management of land resources and promotes conservation and protection of the environment and sustainable use of natural resources.

The Sector goal is orderly integrated development, preserved natural resources and environmental systems. This will be achieved through implementing sector programmes indicated in pages 124-128 of the draft CIDP document.

Water and Irrigation Sector

Madam Speaker, the sector comprises of three sub-sectors namely Water, Irrigation and Sanitation. This sector contributes to county development by promoting sanitation and supporting water resource management to enhance availability and accessibility to safe and clean water. This will be achieved through drilling/rehabilitation of boreholes, construction of earth dams/pans and expansion of sewer systems. The sector goal is to have a world-class County in provision of safe water for domestic, industrial and irrigation.

The Sector programmes are outlined in pages 130-131 of the drafts CIDP document.

Commercial, Tourism and Labour Affairs Sector

This Sector is comprised of sub-sectors of Trade, Industrialization, Investment, Tourism and Labour Affairs. One of the core functions of the sector is to create conducive environment for trade, investment, tourism and industrialization. This involves promotion, coordination and implementation of integrated socio-economic policies and programmes, which enhances competitiveness, sustainability and equitable socio-economic development in the County Vision Making Machakos a nationally competitive County of choice for trade, investment and tourism.

The sector goal is inclusive and sustainable economic growth, full and productive employment and decent work for all. The Sector programmes are outlined in pages 133-138 of the draft CIDP document

Cross sectoral implementation consideration (page 139-140)

Madam Speaker, the CIDP documents cross sectoral considerations and identifies sector programmes, synergies, adverse impacts and proposes measures to be undertaken to harness synergies or mitigate the adverse impacts.

FLAGSHIP/COUNTY TRANSFORMATIVE PROJECTS

Madam Speaker, the CIDP identifies flagship projects aimed at transforming both social and economic life of the citizens through partnership between the County Government and development partners.

The objectives, outcomes, performance indicators, timeframe, implementation agencies and the cost of the flagship projects have been outlined in the CIDP. (Page 141)

The projects are as follows:

- a. Machakos new city to be located in Machakos sub-county.
- b. Tala market in Tala town at a cost of Ksh. 3.2 Billion

- c. Machakos Commercial Bank in Machakos town at a cost of Kshs.5Billion
- d. Athi River stadium in Athi River town at a cost of Ksh. 1Billion
- e. Universal health care in all sub-counties at a cost of Ksh. 0.8 Billion.
- f. Formula one in Machakos sub-county at a cost of Ksh. 1 billion
- g. Machakos airport in Machakos Sub-county at a cost of Ksh. 1 billion
- h. Machakos water supply and sewer line expansion in Machakos Sub-county at a cost of Ksh. 2.9 billion.

CROSS-CUTTING ISSUES

Hon. Speaker, the CIDP identifies the following crosscutting issues which have shared responsibilities with the National and the County Governments:

a. HIV/AIDS

The County through various sectors is investing in HIV prevention interventions, supporting home based care measures, improving the quality of life of both the infected and affected people and fast tracking the implementation of work place policy on HIV/AIDS.

b. Persons with disabilities

The County Government has put in place strategies to include their representation in project planning, monitoring and evaluation and in various development committees, ensuring PWDs friendly infrastructure and services and empowering them through grants to improve their socio-economic capacity. The county sectors will seek to improve the access of PWDs to Access to Government Procurement Opportunities (AGPO).

c. Land use

The County sectors will ensure proper land planning, effective and efficient utilization of land available to ensure maximum benefits are realized. The County Government is also in the process of formulating land use policy to address the issues.

d. Women and Youth

The County will improve the capacity of women and youth through trainings and information dissemination forums. The sectors will also upscale the involvement of youth in the AGPO by reserving particular tenders for women and youth.

e. Climate change

The County through implementation of various programmes/projects will craft messages and information that will enlighten the communities on dangers of climate change, the activities that are contributing to climate change and collective strategies of mitigating its effects.

f. Environmental degradation

The County will collaborate with all stakeholders to enforce environmental sustainable policies that will enable it realize the SDGs. During implementation of programmes/projects, the County will incorporate tree-planting and growing component, establish County tree planting day, educate and involve students in tree planting, enforce sand harvesting rules and enforce riparian areas conservation.

g. Disaster risk reduction

To minimize the potential disaster impacts, the County will prepare a disaster risk reduction plan. This will assist in mapping out possible disaster-prone regions, response mechanisms and mitigation measures, ensuring approval of all constructions, improving the drainage systems as well as their maintenance, improving the disaster rescue systems, training and displaying information dissemination on how to tackle various disasters

h. Drugs and substance abuse

Drugs and substance abuse has led to low productivity in work place, domestic violence, poor performance in schools and loss of lives. The County is needed to create more awareness on the adverse effects of alcohol and substance abuse.

IMPLEMENTATION FRAMEWORK

Under the implementation framework, the CIDP describes the organizational structure with the following key implementing institutions:

- a) The County Assembly.
- b) County Executive Committee.
- c) The County Public Service Board.
- d) The County Public Service.
- e) County Boards and Committees.
- f) State and non-state agencies.
- g) The Public/ Community.

RESOURCES REQUIRED BY SECTORS

The CIDP outlines a summary of proposed budgetary allocation by sector follows...we have a table with four columns.

Hon. Speaker: Yes, Hon. Chair, you do not have to go through it; let the Members read on the table, the amount.

Hon. Kieti: Thank you, Madam Speaker for the guidance.

MONITORING AND EVALUATION FRAMEWORK

The CIDP documents the Monitoring and Evaluation (M&E) frame work that will be used to track progress on implementation of programs and projects over the entire planning period. The County will involve all stakeholders and development partners in monitoring and evaluation. This will ensure transparency, accountability and public inclusion as contained in the County Integrated Monitoring and Evaluation System (CIMES).

The County Planning Unit (CPU) will spearhead the M & E of the projects in the CIDP through field visits. The unit will do analysis and prepare quarterly and annual reports that will be used to inform decisions, plans, budgets and policy options. (Note: During the implementation of the first CIDP, the Assembly did not receive such reports).

The process of monitoring and evaluation will involve data collection, Analysis and reporting. The data will be collected through surveys and M&E reports from project management committees, sub county and ward project coordinators.

Monitoring and Evaluation Indicators

The CIDP presents details of the indicators as shown in page 152-161 of the CIDP.

PROPOSED PROJECTS PER SECTOR

Madam Speaker, the CIDP further gives description of the projects to be undertaken in every sub county, ward and specific locations in the various sectors these are as shown in page 162- 311 of the CIDP.

PUBLIC PARTICIPATION

Madam Speaker, the Assembly conducted public participation for the CIDP 2018-2022, in the 40 wards from 4th to 7th September, 2018. Members of the public gave their views and highlighted the projects which had been omitted in the document.

Madam Speaker, attached, are the projects proposed by the Public in the forty wards. **(Annexure 1)**

COMMITTEE OBSERVATIONS

Ongoing projects

Under Public Administration sector, modernization of human resource staff records registry was noted as ongoing. The committee observed that this programme has not been included as a planned target for completion in the second CIDP.

Public participation by the Executive

One of the core principles of the Constitution and as highlighted in Section 115 of the County Governments Act is public participation. The committee observed that public participation was not thoroughly done by the County Executive as various projects had not been captured in the document

Linkage of the CIDP and Sustainable Development Plan

The County Government has highlighted ways of linkages between the CIDP and Sustainable Development goals. This has been stated clearly in a table annexed in the report. (page 47 of the draft CIDP).

Linkage of the CIDP with the Kenya Vision 2030, its Medium Term Plans and other Plans, Policies and Strategies

Madam Speaker, the programmes/projects of the Kenya Vision 2030 are implemented through their Medium Term Plans. In the Medium term the CIDP has outlined Flagship projects for implementation in line with pillars of Vision 2030. These include:

- a. Agricultural Insurance Programme with support from the World Bank Group.
- b. Construction of Tier 1 retail market in Athi River.
- c. Construction of a Vocational Training Centre of excellence with an accompanying business incubator.
- d. Completion of the medical equipment services project.
- e. Thwake Multipurpose Water Development programme (being funded under the Public Private Partnership initiative)
- f. Among the other plans approved under the County Government of Machakos is the Machakos New Town Local Physical Development Plan.

CIDP linkage with the Constitution of Kenya and the relevant laws

Madam Speaker, the CIDP highlighted the relevant laws in its preparation and stated that the County Government will continue to be guided by the development priorities identified through citizen engagement forums in its annual budgeting processes. These priorities will be budgeted for and implemented through Annual Development Plans that are prepared in accordance with section 126(1) of the PFM Act, 2012.

It highlights Section 107 which specifies the types and purposes of county plans such as the CIDP, county sectoral plans, county spatial plan and the cities and urban plans. Section

108(1) which states that there shall be a five year county integrated development plan which shall have clear goals and objectives; an implementation plan with clear outcomes; provisions for monitoring and evaluation and clear reporting mechanisms. Sections 108(2) and (3) which further specify what should be identified and included in the CIDP.

Madam Speaker, the above sections have been taken into account in the preparation of the CIDP. The County Government has already developed an Agriculture sector plan, and will be working towards preparation of other sector plans. The department of Lands will be developing a county spatial development framework, and push for enactment and adoption of county physical planning laws and policies.

Incomplete projects

Madam speaker, it was observed that some of the projects outlined as having been completed are incomplete. Such projects include the Matuu town bus park

Resource gap

Madam Speaker, the CIDP points to a resource gap that may be occasioned by scarce resources. For the County to be able to fully fund the programmes envisaged in the CIDP it requires a budget estimate of Kshs.71.22496 Billion. However, the projected revenue for the next five years is approximated to be Kshs.54.67547 Billion. (Note: there is variance of Kshs.16.54949 Billion, between the resources and the plan whereas Counties are supposed to have a balanced budget).

Public Administration Sector

Madam Speaker, the CIDP outlined the planned targets and achievements for all the sectors under the Public Administration Sector. The County Assembly which for purposes of planning is included in this sector had no data provided.

MEETING WITH THE EXECUTIVE

Madam Speaker, the Committee met with officials of the Executive on 12th September, 2018 to discuss various issues which came up during the interrogation of the Draft CIDP document. The following were the issues which were discussed in the meeting:

a. Variance of Ksh. 16.54949 Billion, between the County resources and the CIDP

Members noted that there was a variance of Ksh. 16.54949 Billion, between the resources and the Plan. The officer from the Department of trade, and Economic planning, informed the committee that:

- a) The Department was planning to form a resource mobilization unit with an aim of making sure that all revenue due to the county is collected.
- b) The department will also look for donors to partner with the county in financing some of the projects in the CIDP.
- c) The County Government of Machakos will enhance public private partnership in implementing some of the projects in the CIDP.
- d) Further, there will be mid-term review to check whether the variance is achieved failure to which the variation will be adjusted accordingly.
- e) The 16 billion variation figure will be spread for the 5 years of the CIDP plan.
- f) Development partners willing to partner with the County will do some of the projects of their choice which are in the CIDP.

- g) The County of Machakos will develop a frame work of engaging the civil society in implementing some of the projects in the CIDP.
 - h) Civic education will be conducted to the members of public to understand their rights.
- b. Projects Proposed by the Public during public participation conducted by the Assembly**

Members noted that many projects proposed by the public during public participation had not been incorporated in the CIDP.

The Chief Officer informed members that, all projects will be included in the CIDP 2018 – 2022.

c. Projects mentioned to have been completed in the first CIDP yet not done.

Hon. Speaker, on the Matuu Bus Park highlighted in the CIDP as having been fully graded and tarmacked. The Chief Officer informed members that grading, murruming and installation of mlika mwizi were carried in the Bus Park. Tarmacking was not in the initial plan of the Bus Park but would be considered in future plans.

d. Incomplete Projects in the Last CIDP

Members noted that the Plan did not highlight the strategies in place to complete the ongoing projects. Questioned on the strategies put in place for the incomplete projects, the Chief Officer pointed out that the incomplete projects will be rolled up to the current 2018 – 2022 CIDP. Some of the incomplete projects include Market shades, ECDE classes, Public Toilets, Boreholes and dispensaries

e. Tourism Department

Hon. Speaker, It was noted that Tourism Department was under funded. The officer explained that this was occasioned by the meager resources available in the County.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATIONS

Madam Speaker, the Committee recommends as follows:

1. The Constitution of Kenya provides as follows:

Article 1(2): All sovereign power belongs to the people of Kenya. The people may exercise their sovereignty directly or through their elected representatives.

Article 10 (2) a, b and c: The national values and principles of governance include; democracy and participation of the people; inclusiveness; good governance, integrity, transparency and accountability.

Article 27: The Constitution guarantees equality and non-discrimination. Hence, public participation should ensure equality and non-discrimination.

Article 33: Public participation should respect the freedom of expression of all participants.

Article 174(c): Objects of devolution are: to give powers of self-governance to the people and enhance their participation in the exercise of such powers in decision-making.

Article 174(d): Communities have the right to manage their own affairs and to further their development.

In view of the above provisions of the Constitution, the Committee recommends that all the projects proposed by the Public during Public

participation conducted by the County Assembly from 4th to 7th September, 2018 , be included in the CIDP 2018-2022 (Proposed projects attached)

2. The CIDP highlights some of the constraints in the implementation of the previous CIDP as Poor involvement of all stakeholders during planning and implementation of programmes/projects leading to poor adoption, lack of community ownership, delayed implementation, vandalism and theft of project equipment and materials. The Committee recommends that the involved accounting officers be held accountable for any of the materials and moneys lost during implementation of such projects.
3. That the incomplete programmes and projects from the first CIDP be prioritized for completion in the current CIDP.
4. The County Executive puts in place adequate budgetary control measures to ensure expenditure is within the approved budget and avoid accumulation of pending Bills in each financial year since pending Bills slow down development.
5. The plan highlights that one of the constraints for implementation of the previous CIDP was inadequate budget provisions due to limited resources. It is therefore recommended that clear revenue strategies, asset management strategies, financial management strategies, Capital Financing Strategies and enhancement of cost-effectiveness as stipulated in Section 108 of the County Governments Act of 2012 be adopted by the County Executive during implementation of the current plan.
6. That the flagship project on formula 1 racing be scrapped as it is not a priority to the people of Machakos:
7. That the Executive incorporates all the achievements of the County Assembly under the Public Administration Sector as follows;
 - a) Establishment of the first and second County Assembly Service Board
 - b) Vetted and Approved CEC members, County Secretary, Chief Officers and Members of County Public Service Board for the 1st County Government.
 - c) Approval of members of County Land Control Boards.
 - d) Approval of the first CIDP.
 - e) Approved ADP, CFSP and budget estimates of the County for each Financial Year.
 - f) Established house committees; select; sectoral and ad hoc committees
 - g) Recruited 102 County Assembly staff.
 - h) Developed a strategic Plan and Embraced performance contracting.
 - i) Made the Assembly open to the public and held public participation in all the 40 wards.
 - j) Automation of Assembly processes: IPPD, IFMIS, Biometric, LMS, POS.
 - k) Acquisition of office equipment and facilities.
 - l) Infrastructural Development: New office block, laying of the Assembly LAN, Constructed parking, canteen, perimeter wall, sunk borehole, security apparatus (CCTV and walk-through scanners), Renovation of

- offices and chamber, installation of a dedicated Wi-Fi, connection, server room and resource centre.
- m) Capacity building of MCAs and Staff.
 - n) Formation of staff welfare committee.
 - o) Established and equipped 40 Ward offices
 - p) Established Linkages with development partners such as AHADI.
 - q) Development a specific leadership and integrity code for state officers and code of conduct for staff.
 - r) Formation of corruption prevention committee.
 - s) Enacted 44 Acts and approved 25 subsidiary legislations.
 - t) Acquired bus and other vehicles for MCAs and staff
 - u) Moved 313 motions, received and dispensed 15 petitions, 73 statements requested with 28 being responded to.
 - v) Adoption of the Assembly internal controls through annual audit programmes.
8. Under the flagship project on Machakos Commercial Bank, the Committee recommends that the County Government establishes Microfinance instead of a Bank.
 9. The County Government should comply with section 107 of the PFM Act, which provides the principle of public finance management so as to attract more funds in form of conditional grants. This calls for the County to stick to the budget calendar as stipulated.
 10. That Allocation of resources should be in the following order of preference
 - Health
 - Water
 - Agriculture
 - Education
 - Infrastructure
 - Orphans
 - PWDs
 - Youth
 - Women
 - Sports
 11. That a sub-programme be created under the sector on lands, environment, on rehabilitation of Quarry mines.
 12. That construction of a drug abuse and youth rehabilitation center be included in the CIDP, under the sector on Education and Social Welfare.
 13. Under Education and Social Welfare, the Committee recommends more training and more programmes for the PWDs in each year.
 14. The plan highlights poor partnership with other development partners as a constraint in implementation of the previous CIDP, which led to delayed approval of some projects from the relevant authorities such as KENHA. The Committee notes that a Public Private Partnership Unit (PPPU) may be established under Section 8 of the Public Private Partnership (PPP) Act, 2013. The PPP Unit's focus will be to serve as the secretariat and technical arm of the PPP Committee, which will be mandated with assessing and approving

PPP projects in the County.

The PPP Unit will be the resource centre for best practice and guardian of the integrity of the PPP process, and will play a special role in identifying problems, making recommendations to the PPP Committee regarding potential solutions, and ensuring that projects meet such quality criteria as affordability, value for money, and appropriate transfer of risk.

The Committee therefore recommends that the Executive adopts a Public Private Partnership (PPP) framework to improve the quality, quantity, cost-effectiveness and timely provision of much needed public projects and services in the County through partnership with the private sector, local and international stakeholders.

ACKNOWLEDGEMENT

Madam Speaker, the Committee on Trade, Planning and Industrialization is grateful to the Office of the Speaker and that of the Clerk to the County Assembly for facilitating the committee to undertake its mandate. I wish to express my appreciation to the Honorable Members of the Committee who sacrificed their time to participate in the meetings and in preparation of this report.

Madam Speaker, it is therefore my privilege, on behalf of the Trade, Planning and Industrialization Committee to table the report on County Integrated Development Plan 2018-2022, in this Hon. House for consideration and adoption. Thank you, Madam Speaker.

(Applause)

Hon. Speaker: Thank you very much Hon. Kieti for your commendable job on the reading of a very long document thank you, members for your patience listening to the reading.

(Question proposed)

I now invite the members, Hon. Kalumu.

Hon. Kalumu: Thank you Madam Speaker for granting me the chance. I would like to first thank the committee for a good job that they have done and also highlighting issues concerning planning of our county. Secondly, I would like to talk about planning; it is said if you fail to plan, you plan to fail. Secondly planning was also started by God himself through Jeremiah 29:11. And also planning portrays proper mind use and use of resources prudently without just touching there by there and wastage of resources which are very scarce.

Again, Madam Speaker, this CIDP came here I believe sometimes before and I believe the impediments that were there were already resolved. That is what I believe because there were some issues that were to be resolved before it came to the floor of the House; I believe that they have been resolved and if they have been resolved Madam Speaker, I believe that communication has been done and I thank you for that.

Again Madam Speaker, this CIDP looking at it, I have gone through it and I have looked on several sectors and some of the representations that have been made are shown that all the projects that were given during the public participation of the CIDP are not fully captured. So, a lot of time is needed for a proper projects framework to be given to be included in this CIDP so that some of the wards are not left out.

Again I have looked at it and I have not seen any policy framework to guide the implementation of the CIDP; I have not seen it and I will not just pass a plan whereby it is just said and it is not done. Again under health sector, our population of this Machakos County is growing and a healthy county is a productive county. I believe expansion of Machakos Level V would have been a good plan which I have not seen here in this one.

So I would beg the committee to at least try if they can include it so that our people in future may get treatment from there because if you go now to Machakos Level V you will find that some of the patients are waiting and every person here is a candidate to be a patient. No one who is called a patient, no one who can be told my name is a patient. Everyone is a candidate so we need to look into that.

Hon. Speaker: Hon. Kalumu, if I may just interrupt briefly. Hon. Members, just switch off your mic. I heard Hon. Kalumu make a comment that there are programs that were proposed by the public which are not in the draft CIDP; what is the thinking of the members in this House so that then if you need some time to address the inclusion of those projects we save time now and we agree how you do it and how quickly you can do it then we come and debate the report. So let me start with the Hon. Majority Leader, I will come to the Hon. Minority Leader, I will come to the Hon. Whip and please be very brief and Hon. Museku. Hon. Ndawa; very briefly so.

Hon. Muendo: Thank you, Madam Speaker. Let me start by saying today I am very happy for we are now as a House agreed to look at our CIDP, Madam Speaker. Under your leadership, we accept that this County belongs to us all. Having said so Madam Speaker, let me say I have gone through the document a bit which this is the first time---

Hon. Speaker: The draft CIDP.

Hon. Muendo: The draft CIDP.

Hon. Speaker: Not the report that has just---

Hon. Muendo: The draft CIDP and I have noticed that some of the projects in some wards are not captured. There are some wards we have not started even the projects are not in the draft so Madam Speaker, it is my feeling and the feeling of the House and although we know the urgency of this CIDP that we cannot tie our hands as Hon. Members and say we pass it with these kind of mistakes which are inside because this is a very important document Madam Speaker, it will guide this County for another five years so we must be sure of the projects which are there.

We must also involve all the members to present what their people have presented in the public participation. Madam Speaker, with all that and also when you look at the works, the printing works on this document Madam Speaker, some of them are not even seen. Madam Speaker, we have seen other counties their CIDP is well-printed; in fact, it looks like the one of the Auditor General. It should be like that for it to be clear to everybody because it is a public document.

So, Madam Speaker, I propose we postpone the debate and the whole House be left here and then we look at a day as from today a day either tomorrow or Thursday that we can align this document and the Executive also must be informed that we did some amendments on this

because not everything is captured on this. Thank you, Madam Speaker.

Hon. Speaker: So, I will just address from where I sit. Hon. Members when the Hon. Kieti was reading, I saw that he mentioned that there was an engagement with the officers from the Executive; that was sometimes in September, 2018 and those officers is not clearly indicated which ones they were but you also remember the issues of the pending CECs, the issues of the COs and so on. From around February I think when we had the meeting, the prayers every other occasion I meet the Governor, I have been raising the issue of pending CIDP, CEC and COs and actually the Majority Leader and Minority Leader and other leaders have been asking we have a meeting to engage the executive so that we can resolve the issue of the CIDP.

I think the reason why some of those projects are not captured maybe because the interaction with the executive has not been even up to now. That you may not have sat with the COs; you approved a number of COs here. So if we are going to pass the report as it is and I hear what the Majority Leader is saying even as I am coming to hear the others you are going to be tied by this document for the next five years three years and you may push it in a hurry then you come to find that you cannot do development because anything which is not here will not be committed to any public fund; not even a cent.

It makes sense if you can take time the shortest possible perhaps Hon. Kieti and the other members and even call the COs right away, the executive that is, let them include what programs mwananchi want in this. It is just a matter of a day. Then you debate this when you are ready satisfied and the report remember is already the property of this House because I have proposed the question so it is not in the committee.

Which means inclusion is now all of you having to bring what is not here in the CIDP so that when we debate it will be even faster because all of you are happy with it. At that point we will not have a lot of arguments. So let me hear what Hon. Kamitu has to say and very quickly remember I have a meeting I am going to see the County Commissioner with the Minority and the Majority Leaders.

Hon. Kamitu: Thank you very much, Madam Speaker. Madam Speaker, I will not go far from the sentiments that came up with the Majority Leader and also your guidelines that you have given us. Truly, a County Integrated Development Plan is a five years plan and for this matter Madam Speaker, if we are going to miss sincerely what the electorate did or gave us during the public participation, then out rightly we shall be far off from the intentions of a County Integrated Development Plan because in essence that is a five year plan and we miss it we are tying ourselves and is like we are committing suicide.

So, it is the feeling of this House it is not in a bad taste we must put things correct so that within the five years we are going to accomplish what also relates to the budgets that we shall be doing or to the Annual Development Plans because they will also be borne by the County Integrated Development Plan.

So it is on that sense Madam Speaker, I would kindly request this House under your guidance that we check as a whole House, we correct the mistakes then we move on because Hon. Members are for it, they are for the CIDP. So, the notion that it is a negativity side, it is not; we are very objective because we want to see things moving in the five years plan in Machakos County. Thank you, Hon. Speaker.

Hon. Speaker: Thank you, Hon. Kamitu. I will talk to you Hon. Chair because it is actually your report. I will come to you very briefly, one minute Hon. Whip.

Hon. Mulatya: Thank you, Madam Speaker. Mine is very simple; as much as we want to pass this report right now because I know we have some deadline on Friday for the closure of finances and all that, Madam Speaker, I would request if we would just postpone briefly and the Majority Leader calls for a full House *Kamukunji* right now so that we can see because everybody knows what is in their wards.

For example, in my ward Madam Speaker, the boreholes they have given have been sunk in these markets by Plan Kenya; for many years they have been operating. In Mutuamwaki and Kavwea all these places they have boreholes and that is what is captured here. So, I think very quickly, we can remain as a house we deliberate then we consult the executive immediately we see how quickly they can act even if it is today.

Even if they will come over today or tomorrow however quickly they can come so that we can pass this important document.

Hon. Speaker: Agreed, thank you; I hear you. Hon. Ndawa, half a minute.

Hon. Ndawa: Thank you, Madam Speaker. I have a different opinion. I was for the opinion that we pass the CIDP as it is then after passing it so as to unlock the lock that is in the office of the Controller of Budget because if we do not have this document passed, it means we cannot access any government development fee. And this is going to---

Hon. Speaker: Point of order.

Hon. Muendo: Thank you, Madam Speaker. Let me inform the member that the word pass, when you pass that is what you have passed this document when you pass it you cannot re-pass it. This document is going to head to the CoB where all these projects will be captured when she is releasing the funds. So, therefore, Hon. Member, we are not saying this document is not going to be stopped. We are just going to defer for a day or two we correct to capture all the projects for the five years. Thank you, Madam Speaker.

(Applause)

Hon. Speaker: Thank you, Hon. Member. Hon. Ndawa I have heard your sentiment please sit down. I have heard that your sentiment is that we proceed but you can feel the mood. I have heard your sentiment just sit down let us carry on and remember we are not debating it is about an adjournment and I am about to make my decision because we are wasting time which we do not even have. We are not even debating the report. So, I will just have the comment of the Chair of planning committee who was on the floor reading.

Hon. Kieti: Thank you Madam Speaker for giving me this chance. I have observed that the annexure for the ward projects which Members identified during the public participation are the ones that are not up to date; I do not know whether it is typographical errors or what it is because even in my ward only the projects that have been captured are for the environment only.

So, my request is that Madam Speaker, if the Hon. Members who represent various wards can just update the list of the projects that were captured during public participation in this

annexure I think everything will flow. Because it is only those projects that are lacking here is not in the CIDP draft that we got from the executive.

(Applause)

Hon. Speaker: Thank you, Hon. Member. So what we are going to do Hon. Members, you will take...how many minutes can we have now? When we adjourn this time you be left as a House and put your heads together very briefly ad then we will resume the debate still today. Are we in agreement on that? So how long do you want to be given or can we agree we just resume it at 2.30 p.m. so that you have the time?

Hon. Members: Yes.

ADJOURNMENT

Hon. Speaker: So Hon. Members on the consensus of the Members in this House, the debate is going to be suspended and the House is given time between now and 2.30 p.m. to put your heads together on this matter and then we will continue with the debate on the CIDP at 2.30 p.m. on the 3rd day of July 2019. Thank you, Hon. Members.

(Loud consultations)

The Speaker, is still in the House Hon. Members what is happening? You are becoming disorderly; the Speaker, has not even stepped down to walk out and then you start making noise.
